Introduction

Tri-Council Policy Statement: Ethical Conduct for Research Involving Humans (TCPS 2), 2010

- Underlying value:
 - Respect for human dignity
- Expressed through three core principles:
 - Respect for Persons
 - Concern for Welfare
 - ✓ Justice

Recruitment

Ethical Principal of Justice

Do new technologies facilitate recruitment?

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- Online communities
- Do new technologies ensure that all eligible participants are able to take part?
 - Do they have easy access to technology (e.g. internet)?
 - Are potential participants familiar with the use of the technology?



Recruitment (Cont'd)

Respect for persons

- How are participants recruited?
 - □ In person?
 - Online?
 - Where are advertisements placed?
 - What information must advertisements contain?

Informed Consent

Ethical Principal of Respect for Persons

- How should online consent be obtained?
- What information should be provided?
 - How to dispel possibility of therapeutic misconception?



Informed Consent (Cont'd)

Ethical Principal of Respect for Persons

Authenticity of consent



Weighing Risks

Concern for Welfare

- Risks
 - Severity
 - Probability



Weighing Risks (Cont'd)

Concern for Welfare

Risks

- Right to privacy
 - Disclosure of health information
 - Inappropriate disclosures
 - Text messaging reminders?
 - Tracking and monitoring
 - IP addresses, location
 - Expectation of privacy
 - Security

Weighing Risks (Cont'd)

Concern for Welfare

- Risks
 - Social
 - Stigma
 - Psychological
 - Lack of direct contact (Cohen, 2013)
 - Follow up
 - De-briefing
 - Referral
 - Other

Weighing Risks (Cont'd)

Concern for Welfare

- Risks
 - Is the technology burdensome?
 - E.g. Malfunction, theft, etc.



- Can participants be assured access to mobile devices, applications, after a study has ended, if they improve health outcomes?
 - E.g. eHealth devices, smart phones
